“ So how do you write an adequate tribute or special memory in honor of your recently deceased Mother ? I mean my Mother was my mother for almost 70 years. Her life and every breath was devoted to her children. The stories and love are endless.

Mom has been "passed" now for just over 48 hours. Family and service activities, plans development and necessary communications have consumed her children and husband. So now, as those requirements are on the wane, I have a few moments to contemplate my 70 years as being my Mother's son. Don't worry this is going to be short what she meant to me and my family cannot adequately be put into words.

So I tried to think of one story of my Mother's life that would best exemplify who my Mother was.

In the early 1960's, a pre civil rights legislation era in America, my Mother was the concessions manager at Fairview-American Little League in Anderson. In this role she worked countless hours procuring and delivering all products sold and served across the concession stand counter window. On many occasions she had to meet vendor and suppliers in order to receive these products at off schedule hours. She planned and supported special event days at the ball park. She recruited workers to support the concessions activities. Five nights a week she opened and closed the concession stand.

Popcorn, candy, hot dogs, sloppy joes, sandwich buns, ice cream, Pepsi Cola, bagged ice, paper plates, napkins and cups ...and four kids were her life. I never once recall her complaining about those roles.

Fairview-American Little league's geographic district, as to who could play there, encompassed virtually all the area of Anderson where African American family's lived and resided. Many of those residents and their children lived many miles from the ball park. But

the kids always made their way every night to the ball park by walking or riding their bikes. But come they would. And the kids would hang around the concession stand late into the evening and wait. They would wait for mom to give them "dinner". She would fix a little extra knowing that these kids would be here to perhaps eat their only food of the day. And feed 'em she would. I still remember the names and faces of some of these children and Mom never missed a meal for them.

Throughout the rest of her life in every discussion whether the topic was political, social, religious , education Mom would ask "What about the children ?" That was her motto her guiding principle in life.

Me and the children love ya Mom !
